Introduction

Since the last week of February 2009, SSVK has been running a relief intervention programme in Murliganj and Kumarkhand Blocks of Madhepura District with support from Subodh Gupta, Bharti Kher, Nature Morte, Trident Gurgaon & Saffron Art. The intervention is targeted at 4,000 families whose lives were devastated by the catastrophic floods of Kosi in August 2008.



Project

Goal: The overall goal is to the poor enable and marginal families to break out of the current crisis resulting from the floods

Specific Objectives

- Relief support during the crucial period of non availability of food and water by ensuring availability of both
- 2. Making accessible a
- package of health care, and medicinal services for one month that seeks to protect children, mothers, the aged and the infirm
- Responding to the basic utilities required by the flood victims like clothes, 3. kitchen utensils, bedding, storage and cover against the elements of weather
- 4. Addressing the educational needs of children
- Enable the flood victims to undertake livelihood activities for rebuilding their lives



Proposed Interventions:

- 1. Provision of dry ration support (flat rice and jaggery) and one wholesome cooked meal a day to 4000 families for 30 days and consisting of rice, dal and a vegetable of potatoes and nutri nugget through setting up of a community kitchen in each of the 12 targeted villages
- 2. Installation of 2 hand pumps each in 75 flood affected
- Extension of Medical Assistance for flood induced diseases like diarhhoea, fever, gastroenteritis, abdominal pain, deworming, acidity, cold and cough, pneumonia, skin and eye infection and malaria.

- 4. Provision of Family Packs to 4'000 families comprising blanket, durrie, warm clothes for children, kitchen utensil, saree, dhoti, mosquito net, shawl, towel and plastic mat and aluminium box
- 5. Setting up of 1 NFE centre each in the 12 intervention villages
- 6. Provision of working capital support to 500 families to initiate income generating activities

Summary of Phase I interventions

The first phase of the relief intervention lasted from February 22, 2009 till March 24, 2009. In light of the limited resources received as part of the 1st instalment, SSVK could not take up all the proposed interventions and had to completely drop interventions pertaining to provision of family packs and working capital support.

With regard to provision of dry ration support and one wholesome meal a day to 4'000 families, SSVK scaled down the coverage from 4000 families to 1332 families for the 1st phase. However, ground reality compelled it to include another 319 families. Thus dry ration and community kitchen coverage was extended to 1651 families spread over 4 villages and over a one month period extending from February 22 to March 24, 2009.(For details of coverage, kindly refer the Phase I report already sent across by SSVK).

Against a stipulated installation of 150 hand pumps, 4 handpumps were installed.

Medical Assistance was extended for flood induced diseases like diarhhoea, fever, gastroenteritis, abdominal pain, deworming, acidity, cold and cough, pneumonia, skin and eye infection and malaria to 6284 patients spread over 12 villages. (For details refer Phase I report).

Against a stipulated coverage of 1 NFE centre for each of the 12 targeted villages, 12 NFE centres had actually been in operation since January 2009 with a combined enrollment of 1952 students (1079 boys and 873 girls). (For centre wise coverage details kindly refer Phase I report).



Interventions actually undertaken and achieved results in phase II:

1. Provision of dry ration support (flat rice and jaggery) and one wholesome cooked meal a day to 4000 families for 30 days and consisting of rice, dal and a vegetable of potatoes and nutri nugget through setting up of a community kitchen in each of the 12 targeted villages: As 1651 families from 4 of the 12 targeted villages had already been extended coverage in phase I of relief operations, phase II was targeted at covering the remaining 2349 families spread over the other 8 of the 12 targeted villages. However, ground reality compelled it to include another 267 families. Thus



dry ration and community kitchen coverage was extended to 2616 families spread over 8 villages and over a one month period extending from May 14 to June 12, 2009. Of the expenses incurred on these 267 extra families, expenses for 140 were charged to the project budget and that for the remaining 127 were met out of SSVK's own resources. Details of phase II coverage are as follows:

The intervention came as a critical input to enable the beneficiaries to tide over a period when floods had left them bereft of any livelihood opportunities to sustain themselves and they were on the threshold of starvation. Moreover it prevented them from getting deeper into the debt trap by not having to borrow from moneylenders for their nutritional needs. The intervention could provide them a measure of food security and was appropriately timed as it came when almost all sources of external support had been phased out.

Community kitchens along with ready to eat dry ration support were preferred over just dry ration support as the latter would have left the beneficiaries with the difficult, if not impossible, choice of arranging for fuel. Moreover, by engaging the victims in various tasks associated with running the community kitchens helped maintain a modicum of community conviviality which also helped the victims in overcoming their enormous grief.

2. Installation of 150 hand pumps in flood affected hamlets:



Against a stipulated installation of 150 hand pumps, 150 have actually been installed in two blocks Murliganj and Kumarkhand block of Madhepura District.



The installation of new hand pumps has ensured access of the target group to clean and safe drinking water. The availability of safe drinking water has reduced the vulnerability of the target group by acting as a check on incidence of morbidity. For the entire period of relief operations, no significant outbreak of any water borne epidemic was reported from the field.

3. Extension of Medical Assistance for flood induced diseases: Medical Assistance was extended for diseases like diarhhoea, fever, gastroenteritis, abdominal pain, deworming, acidity, cold and cough, pneumonia, skin and eye infection and malaria in the following villages in phase II:

In all 5067 patients were covered. SSVK's trained cadre of community health workers adept in symptomatically diagnosing the commonly occurring health problems during floods and in their aftermath addressed the heath needs of the affected families. This intervention provided much needed medical succour to the flood victims.

4. Provision of Family Packs to 4'000 families comprising blanket, durries, warm clothes for children, kitchen utensil, saree, dhoti, mosquito net, shawl, towel and plastic mat and aluminium box: This intervention has been kept in abeyance and is still to be initiated. This budget head entails a sizeable resource engagement. In light of the volume of two installments that have been transferred to date, SSVK felt that the expenses on other interventions enjoyed greater priority than provision of family packs. Now with the balance accruing with SSVK after phase II and the residual amount that still remains to be transferred to SSVK, this intervention (family packs) will be suitably planned/modified for phase III of the intervention.



6. **Setting up of 1 NFE centre each in 12 villages:** The 12 NFE (Child Care) centres which had been in operation from before this project have been

These NFE (Child Care) centres have been subserving a wide variety of purposes including games, tuition classes and peer activities. SSVK recognises the need to have a focus on children who despite counting amongst the most vulnerable in the event of disasters are seldom the focus of relief organisations. Relief interventions normally restrict themselves to addressing the immediate physical survival needs of children which is no doubt important but not enough. Hence, in order to ensure that the disaster does not impair children's mental, social and emotional development, SSVK continues running the NFE (Child Care) centres to address these concerns.

Each centre has two educators cum counsellors and is being used for a wide variety of purposes, including games, tuition classes, peer activities and pre schools. Teaching and learning materials in the form of books, copies, blackboards, slates, pencils, chalk, duster, eraser, pencil cutters, school bags and recreational material in the form of toys and games have been made available at all the centres. The centres operate from 1 p.m. to 3 p.m and activities comprise a mix of educational and recreational activities. Children at each centre are organised into sub groups in accordance with their learning levels and educational inputs to the sub groups are provided on the basis of their learning levels. This not only helps keeping the children



enthused but also keeps the teaching learning objectives of the centre more focussed.

6. Provision of working capital support to 500 families to initiate income generating activities: The intervention, not taken up during the 1st phase and carried out completely during the 2nd phase was targeted at 500 socially and economically marginalized families who, following the recession of flood waters, had returned to their villages from their temporary abode on the embankment of MBD canal in Madhepura District but found their travails far from over. With the kharif (summer) crop lost to the floods and chances of rabi (winter) cultivation obliterated due to the still soggy fields, the targeted families had lost their main source of livelihood which came from working as farm hands for wages on agricultural fields and was complemented by their practicing of subsistence farming on small tracts of land taken on a share cropping basis.

Livelihood restoration initiatives have ensured regular cash incomes to the aforementioned 500 families and with the summer crop season round the corner they look forward to supplementing their incomes from opportunities for wage income as agricultural labourers and subsistence farming as share croppers.

The intervention came as a critical input to enable the beneficiaries to tide over a period when floods had left them bereft of any livelihood opportunities to sustain themselves and they were on the threshold of starvation. More, importantly this support came in at a time when the Bihar government, despite the best of its intentions and efforts, was being able to reach out with its relief interventions to less than 10% of the flood victims and the non governmental actors, who had registered a tumultuous presence in the immediate aftermath of the floods, had either started getting scarce from the area or else were being driven by their sectoral agendas (hardly any of it with livelihood restoration as its focus) irrespective of the real needs



of the people. The intervention has helped provide these flood victims a measure of food security.

Monitoring by SSVK:

At the organisational level a Monitoring Committee comprising organisational staff and some local community leaders has been ensuring that the intervention has been able to reach out to the targeted, that the finances are being used for the purpose for which they had been earmarked and that standards of fairness and transparency were being met. They undertake regular field routes to review the work in progress, conduct meetings to resolve any problems coming on the sites ensure adherence to the targeting process and supervise the upkeep of records.

In each intervention village a display board was set up with all the details of the intervention and the name of the donor indicated on it. The relevant government officials were given a copy of the proposal and the approved budget and the support of the panchayat representatives in the effective implementation of the intervention was successfully leveraged. A copy of this report would also be submitted to the government and also uploaded on the SSVK website.

A purchasing committee made all purchase related decisions. Procurement of goods followed these guidelines:

- goods were to be of satisfactory quality
- the goods had to be delivered in good order and condition and in accordance with the Project timetable
- the price paid for goods represented value for money
- > there was open and effective competition in the purchasing process

For the working capital support for initiating income generating activities, the beneficiaries were identified, after a thorough survey of the intervention villages on the basis of the following criteria:

- They had customarily practised vocations that they were seeking support for
- The quantum of support sought was in line with the minimum support required for viably carrying out the activity
- In the aftermath of floods they would be the first ones to bring in income for the family
- The beneficiaries were from families who had been extended relief support by SSVK when displaced from their original habitation they were forced to take refuge on the embankment of the MBD canal.

The identified beneficiaries were made to fill an application form which carried their photo identity, the name of the vocation for which they required support and the quantum of support required. This application became the basis for the eventual disbursement of financial support to the targeted families.

Following the disbursement of loans, the project coordinator along with a team of volunteers and in presence of the beneficiaries facilitated the purchase of assets wherever was the case. In instances where assets of a particular type (like fishing nets) were to be bought in large numbers a favourable cost was negotiated for the beneficiaries. Following the disbursement of the financial support and the acquisition of income generating assets, coordinator along with his team of volunteers has been closely following it up at the level of beneficiaries that they are viably engaging in the activity they have been supported for and where need be even offer business counselling support.



Disbursement of cash and distribution of assets for income generating activities were made in public spaces with banners clearly displaying the name of the funders and details of the proposed intervention along with the budget line for the various activities. At all child care centres banners clearly display the same details as above. Organisational records with regard to the implementation are regularly updated. SSVK is maintaining a separate project accounting system for the project. All accounts, records and assets registers contain clear audit trails and adequate project management records in relation to expenditure.

Moreover SSVK has been making information about its interventions as widely public as possible through sharing of intervention related details with local stakeholders, to putting up of public display boards at its intervention sites, to uploading details about the organization and its interventions on its website (www.ssvk.org) to making such information available to nationally renowned web sites like (www.indianngos.com www.karmayog.org/biharfloods/, http://www.indiawaterportal.org/bihar/?p=214#more-214

Apart from all this the organisation has done an extensive photo documentation of the activities associated with the intervention.

Challenges

The year being one of unprecedented

floods put the organisation under a lot of pressure for rehabilitative support from those affected families who were not covered. However, through maintaining high standards of transparency in rehabilitative operations, taking the local administration and the panchayat representatives into confidence, engaging local cadre of volunteers and involving the target group they could ward off such pressures. Systems like having a pre-designated beneficiary identification system in place helped the organization in managing the risk of being overwhelmed by the demand. Moreover, its wealth of experience in running relief and rehabilitative interventions over a period of more than 2 decades also came in handy.
